LESSON 1 A Humanitarian from the Beginning

Imagine being Adam and Eve right after they were created. Talk about a mind-blowing experience. Everywhere they looked, there were magnificent sights to take in. Trees of every shape and size bearing a wonderful variety of fruit. Flowers abounding in a dazzling array of colors. A seemingly endless selection of herbs and plants to sample.

And then there were all the animals! Massive elephants trumpeting. Majestic lions roaring. Nimble monkeys chattering. Colorful birds chirping. On and on it went. No zoo, no matter how spectacular, comes close to what Adam and Eve experienced in Eden.

Especially because everything lived in perfect harmony! God had created a perfect world where death did not exist. In fact, there was nothing negative. No fear. No pain. No sorrow. Only total peace and joy.

But Adam and Eve didn't just live there. God put them in charge of this magnificent world. He told them:

"Have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth" GENESIS 1:28

In this and in other ways God showed that Adam and Eve were the crown of his creation.

Another way he showed this was by creating them in a different way. He created everything else by just speaking. Talk about power! He just spoke and the entire universe, with all its wonders and intricacies, instantaneously came into being. But the pattern changes when he creates Adam and Eve. He created Adam from the earth and Eve from Adam.

More importantly, he created them in his image – a concept that has often been misunderstood. People often think this refers to a physical image. But other Scriptures show this was a spiritual image, namely, that like God, they were holy and without sin.

In all this, God shows how, even from the very beginning, his focus was on helping mankind. That, from the very beginning, he was a humanitarian – the ultimate humanitarian.

- Before everything else was, God was.
- God created a perfect world with no sin, sorrow, or sadness.
- God created the world just by speaking.
- God created Adam from the earth and Eve from Adam.
- God created Adam and Eve as the crown of his creation.
- God put Adam and Eve in charge of the world he had made.
- God created Adam and Eve in his image holy and without sin.
- From the beginning, God's focus was on helping humanity.
- In the beginning, Adam and Eve had a perfect relationship with God and each other.

Extra Insights

In trying to understand the concept of the image of God, it may be helpful to describe the effect the divine image had on the personality of Adam and Eve—on their intellect, emotions, and will.

Unlike the mental dullness and ignorance we bring with us into the world, Adam and Eve understood perfectly with their intellect what God wanted them to know. While they possessed the image of God, their emotions were also in tune with God's; they found their greatest happiness in God.

And unlike the rebellious will each of us brought into the world, their will was in complete harmony with God; what he wanted was what they wanted. Every impulse and desire of theirs was in tune with God's good will. Created in the image of God, they were human replicas of what God is like. We know that this beautiful relationship with God was destroyed when Adam and Eve doubted God's love, disobeyed his command, and dragged the whole human race down with them.

All of the descendants of Adam and Eve, with a single exception, brought a sinful image with them into the world—minds ignorant of God's good plan for them, emotions that find joy in things that displease God, and wills that rebel against God's good and gracious will.

The New Testament brings us the wonderful news, however, that through faith in Christ the image of God is again created in the sinner, who is thereby restored to that precious relationship Adam and Eve once enjoyed with God. As long as we live in a sinful world, the image of God is only partially restored in us by faith. That new nature, created in us by the Holy Spirit, must coexist with the sinful image we received from our parents. John assures us, however, "When [Christ] appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is" (1 John 3:2). When believers enter eternal life, the image of God will be completely restored in them.

Extra Insights

"It's important to remember that the first two human beings came from the hand of their Creator not as half-animals but as royalty, with unrestricted dominion over all of God's creation. Since through sin we have lost this dominion, it's difficult for us to appreciate what this meant for Adam and Eve. In the sinful world in which we live, dominion usually signals conquest and often exploitation. God's two perfect children were to rule everything God had created not in order to dominate or take advantage of it but to protect and preserve it for God. Similarly, Christians, who look upon themselves as stewards of our natural environment, will be sensitive to waste and abuse of the world's natural resources."

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LESSON 2 A Humanitarian in the Face of Rebellion

Blatant disrespect makes our blood boil. Our temperatures immediately rise when we see someone trashing the flag. Or when a child deliberately disobeys their parents.

It's even worse when we are the one being disrespected. We draw a line with our teenager telling them not to cross it. Instead, they look us right in the eye and then intentionally step across it.

This is what Adam and Eve did when they ate the fruit. Theirs was the ultimate act of disrespect. God had done so much for them. He had created them perfectly. He had given them a perfect Paradise to live in. And he only gave them a single command to obey. "Don't eat from the tree of knowledge of good and evil." Even this command was a blessing. For by obeying it, Adam and Eve had a tangible way to demonstrate their love for God.

But they didn't obey. Even though they understood it perfectly. They knowingly ate the fruit. God had drawn the line, and they intentionally crossed it.

Their actions don't get any better. Instead of running to God and confessing what they had done, they hid from him. When God confronted them, Adam had the audacity to blame God.

"The woman whom thou gavest to be with me, she gave me of the tree, and I did eat."

GENESIS 3:12

Talk about blatant disrespect! If anybody deserved to have God rain down lightning bolts on them, it was Adam and Eve.

But that isn't what God did. Yes, he made them suffer serious consequences for their sin. He drove them from Paradise. He told them how their sin would result in their experiencing hard labor. But that's not all he did. He also clothed them. And most importantly, he gave them hope. He immediately promised that one of their descendants would defeat the devil for them and save them. He didn't put them on probation. He didn't make them wonder if he would totally reject them. He gave them immediate comfort and reassurance.

It's difficult to react graciously in the face of rebellion and disrespect. That, however, is what God did with Adam and Eve. This is what he does for us. That is why he is the ultimate humanitarian.

- God commanded Adam and Eve not to eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.
- Adam and Eve could demonstrate love for God by following this command.
- Adam and Eve sinned against God and ate from the tree.
- Adam and Eve hid from God.
- Adam and Eve blamed God.
- God expelled Adam and Eve from Paradise.
- God explained to Adam and Eve the consequences they would suffer because of their sin.
- God then promised a descendant who would defeat the devil.
- God clothed Adam and Eve and gave them hope.
- God acted graciously to Adam and Eve when they sinned.
- God acts graciously to us when we sin.

Take note of how the serpent, Satan, uses half-truths and misquotes from God's words to deceive Adam and Eve. Take note also of how God justly and lovingly deals with Adam and Eve.

Read chapter 2 of God—The Ultimate Humanitarian.

Sometimes the devastation of Fall into sin is downplayed or even turned into a good thing. See the Fall for what it was sin and destruction, but also take note of how God responded.

What qualifies as evil? Who qualifies as evil?

The answer depends on your perspective. Take a skyscraper. Standing next to it, it looks huge. Flying high over it in an airplane, not so much.

The opposite holds true when it comes to evil. The closer we are to it, the less we see it. The further away we are, the clearer it becomes. The problem is, according to the Bible, we can't get away from it. Evil is all around us. We live in an evil world filled with evil people.

This means we can't see evil clearly. One of its most damming effects is that it blinds us to its presence. Therefore we need to listen carefully to God, who alone sees evil clearly.

What he says about it is sobering. Even shocking. Once evil entered the world through Adam's sin, it spread rapidly. So much so that only a couple of chapters later in Genesis, we hear God's chilling indictment of all mankind.

"God saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually." GENESIS 6:5

It couldn't be clearer. Or more total. Evil doesn't just apply to some actions or words. It includes people's "imaginations." And God says every imagination "was only evil continually."

But the people didn't see it this way. They lived their lives, worked at their jobs, got married, and had families. Most would have vehemently rebelled at being described as wicked and evil.

From God's perspective, however, they were. They were because they didn't give him any thought, or they had the wrong idea about him. They thought they could be good enough or do enough to please him. From God's perspective, however, this is the ultimate evil.

God sees this as evil because such thoughts dishonor God by nullifying his tremendous sacrifice to save us. It is like telling the widow of the firefighter who died saving your life that you saved yourself. Or that you helped save yourself even though you were unconscious at the time.

Despite the fact of mankind's wickedness, God did sacrifice his Son to save us. He remained a humanitarian to our evil world.

- Evil is all around us and infects every part of our lives.
- Evil isn't just words and actions; it's also "imaginations" and "thoughts."
- People are often unaware of the problem that evil truly is.
- Many people often don't give God any thought, or they have the wrong ideas about him.

Read chapter 3 of God—The Ultimate Humanitarian.

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LESSON 4 A Humanitarian by Making a Wonderful Covenant

Signing a contract is often a significant event in a person's life. Think of a sports star inking a new contract. Or a couple signing the papers to close on a house.

In most cases, two parties sign a contract. In the case of the sports star, not only the star but also the owner's representative sign. With the couple buying a house, the previous owners sign along with the new owners. These contracts are based on the premise of "if, then." If one party does something, then the other party will act.

Such contracts are called bilateral. Rare are unilateral contacts where only one party signs and acts regardless of what the other party does. The most common example are wills. In most wills, there are no ifs. The heirs inherit no matter what they do.

Therefore it's extremely exciting that the most important contract of all, God's plan of salvation, is unilateral. The Bible doesn't use the word contract. Instead, it talks about covenants, a word which usually describes especially important contracts. As I said, it is beyond exhilarating that when we hear God talking about eternal life, he speaks in terms of a unilateral covenant. He is the one who does all the work to put it into effect.

God made this point in a vivid way with Abraham in the Old Testament. Today, most contacts are put into effect when they are notarized by a notary public. Then, and only then, are they official. In the Old Testament, they had a striking ceremony which served a

similar purpose. The two parties would cut various animals in half, lay the halves in two rows, and then both parties would walk between the rows. This put the covenant into effect. Interestingly, the Hebrew term used to make a covenant literally means "to cut a covenant."

In a marvelous vision, God gave Abraham, he used the picture of this ceremony to teach Abraham that his covenant of eternal life was unilateral. For God was the only one who walked through the two rows! Abraham was an observer – and a recipient – a recipient who didn't have to do anything!

God has enacted this same unilateral covenant with you. He offers you eternal life as a gift. He can do this because Jesus died in your place to pay for all your sins. Jesus kept all the commandments perfectly and gives you all the credit.

• Most contracts are two-sided, and each party needs to do something for contract validity.

- More rarely, contracts are one-sided, such as in the case of a will.
- God's most important contract with us is a one-sided contract called a "covenant."
- God does all of the work to put this one-sided covenant into effect.
- Ancient covenants were "cut" with each party participating in a bloody carcass ceremony.
- When God "cut a covenant" with Abraham, he alone passed between the animal carcasses.
- Abraham was a passive observer, yet the recipient of this incredible covenant.
- God has made in Jesus Christ a one-sided covenant with you too.
- Through the sacrifice of Jesus, you are a recipient of all of God's promises.

Read chapter 4 of God—The Ultimate Humanitarian.

Recipients of a one-sided covenant's benefits shift their trust from self and performance to the provider and thankfulness for the blessings bestowed.

Think of how different doctoring was before the invention of the X-ray. There was no way a doctor could see what was happening inside somebody. Now we have a vast array of such diagnostic tools from ultra-sounds to MRI's.

These are especially vital when patients don't realize that anything is wrong with them. Like the people who go in for a routine checkup only to discover they have a tumor. On the one hand, they are shocked. On the other hand, especially if the tumor is treatable, they are so thankful to discover it before it progressed any further.

Sometimes one of the best things that can happen to us is having a serious problem identified.

This is exactly what God does for us with his commandments. They are his diagnostic tools to uncover the sin within us. Many people, however, think God gave them as a way to save themselves. Some have compared each commandment to a rung on a ladder. As you keep each one, you climb up the ladder closer to God.

But this isn't how God talks about them. He said,

"By the law is the knowledge of sin." ROMANS 3:20

LESSON 5: A HUMANITARIAN BY GIVING THE LAW

Law is just another term for the commandments. What do they do? They make us aware of our sin. Just like an X-ray reveals what is inside of us, so does God's commandments. Even though we might look spiritually healthy on the outside, they expose how much sin has infected us. They reveal lustful passions, greedy thoughts, hatred, envy – the list goes on and on. Jesus said,

"For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies: These are the things which defile a man."

MATTHEW 15:19

It's shocking to see our spiritual X-ray and how much sin has infected us. But it's so important – especially because God has given us the cure, namely Jesus. Scripture says he is the only antidote for sin.

"The blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin." 1 JOHN 1:7

Friends, don't try to cleanse yourself by trying to keep the commandments. That is not their intent. They are only diagnostic tools. Instead, use them in the way God intended. And then apply the only God-given cure, Jesus Christ. Do that by forsaking all trust in your works and putting all your trust in what Jesus has already done for you.

- The commandments are God's x-ray to show us our sins.
- Many people inaccurately view God's commandments as a way to save themselves.
- Through the commandments, God provides the painful diagnosis of "sinful."
- Like a good doctor, God not only provides us with the diagnosis but with the cure.
- The cure for our sinfulness is the perfect sacrifice of Jesus.
- The commandments lead us to forsake trust in our works.
- Instead of our sinful works, we can trust in the perfect work of Jesus.

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LESSON 6 A Humanitarian at the Temple

How would you like to worship God without once being able to enter the church building? You would come to church and be restricted to standing on the front lawn. This is how it was for the people in the Old Testament. Although the temple was magnificent, with the inside walls overlaid with gold, the vast majority of people never saw the inside. They could only go as far as the courtyard of the temple. Only the priests, the male members of Aaron's family, could enter the temple proper. And even they did so rarely.

In this striking way, God taught the people about the seriousness of sin. Sin separates mankind from God. Any and every sin. It doesn't matter whether we think it's only a minor infraction. To God, all sin is extremely serious. Scripture is clear.

"Whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all."

JAMES 2:10

But God didn't use the temple only to teach about the seriousness of sin. He also showed that the blood of a sacrifice was needed to remove sin. Day in and day out, the temple courtyard resembled a slaughterhouse as countless animals were sacrificed. This occurred from the very beginning. At the temple's dedication, Solomon sacrificed no less than 120,000 sheep and goats and 22,000 cattle!

No matter how many animals were sacrificed, however, they couldn't take away sin. They

all pointed ahead to Jesus, the true Lamb of God, who alone could remove sin. Scripture emphasizes this point.

"And every priest standeth daily ministering and offering oftentimes the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins: But this man, after he had offered one sacrifice for sins for ever, sat down on the right hand of God" HEBREWS 10:11-12

At Jesus' death, God again used the temple to teach an important truth. The temple veil, for centuries, had symbolically separated God from man, When Jesus died, it was suddenly torn from top to bottom. This was miraculous since the veil was four inches thick! In this vivid way, God demonstrated that Jesus had reconciled God and mankind.

Treasure this incident because it shows that Jesus has already paid for all your sins. In him, you can be worthy not only to enter but to remain in God's presence – for all eternity! Trust in him alone!

- KEY POINTS
- The Old Testament temple was a magnificent and marvelous building.
- However, most people weren't even allowed to enter the actual temple.
- The structure of the temple taught God's people about the severe nature of sin.
- The sacrifices of the temple taught God's people about the need for a perfect substitute.
- Countless animals were sacrificed daily, but ultimately none of them could take away sin.
- Instead, the sacrifices served to point to a greater sacrifice, Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God.
- The sacrifice Jesus made paid for all sins' debt, for all time, all people, and all places.
- When he tore the temple curtain from top to bottom, God announced, "Payment made in full."
- Jesus' payment made you worthy to enter and remain in God's presence for all eternity.
- Jesus met all the restrictions and fulfilled all of God's requirements for us.

Extra Insights

The New Testament tells us, "Believers are all temples." Paul says in 1 Corinthians 3:16-17, "Don't you know that you yourselves are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in your midst? If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy that person; for God's temple is sacred, and you together are that temple."

This teaching on believers being the temple of God is so glorious and exhilarating, and it becomes even more exciting when we see that the Greek word Paul used in I Corinthians was one used for the holy of holies. In essence, Paul says that believers are the holy of holies. That should leave us awe-struck – because, in the Old Testament, only one man, the high priest, could enter the holy of holies. And he could only do it on one day each year, the Day of Atonement. But now, because Jesus has removed the sin that separates us from God (signified dramatically with the temple veil being torn at his death), believers have now become the holy of holies. Believers don't just have the privilege of entering the holy of holies once a year like the Old Testament high priest. No, we are the holy of holies! God dwells within us! The more you think about it, the more thrilling it becomes.

And there are not some believers who are worthy to be temples and some who aren't. All believers are God's temples. God, in his love, bestows this honor on each and every person who trusts that they are acceptable to God solely because of what Jesus has done for them.

Did you know Christ is not a name but a title? It's the Greek equivalent for the Hebrew "Messiah" and means the Anointed One. In the Old Testament, kings, prophets, and priests were all anointed into their offices. Their anointment demonstrated they had been appointed by God. Jesus was the Christ, the Anointed One, because he was appointed by God to be our ultimate prophet, priest, and king.

Right now, let's focus on Jesus being the ultimate priest. Old Testament priests represented the people before God. As the people's representatives, one of their main responsibilities was to offer sacrifice for the people.

As our ultimate priest, Jesus didn't sacrifice animals for us; he sacrificed himself! Scripture says:

"Who needeth not daily, as those high priests, to offer up sacrifice, first for his own sins, and then for the people's: for this he did once, when he offered up himself." HEBREWS 7:27

This is amazing. Where else do we see a priest sacrificing himself?

This is unique because Jesus was and is a unique person. From all eternity, he was God himself. This is why his one death could pay for the sins of all people. When Jesus died, it

was nothing less than God sacrificing himself for us! Scripture says that God purchased us with his own blood (Acts 20:28). And only he could do this. Scripture also states no person can pay for the sins of even one other person (Psalm 49:7). Jesus and only Jesus could pay for your sin and my sin. This is why he is the Christ, the ultimate priest.

That's not all. Priests not only sacrificed for the people, but they also prayed for them.

This is something Jesus still does for his believing children. Once again, listen to Scripture.

"He ever liveth to make intercession for them" HEBREWS 7:25

This passage is from Hebrews 7, a chapter in the Bible which emphasizes that Jesus, since he lives forever, is the first and last member of the Melchizedek priesthood. According to Scripture, he alone holds this priesthood.

Because Jesus continues to serve as our priest, we don't need any earthly mediator to help us approach God. In Jesus, we have full access to him. This is tremendously comforting. Wherever you are, whenever it is, you can approach God through Jesus and be confident he will forgive and help you. All because Jesus is the ultimate priest.

- In the Bible, because God appointed them, prophets, priests, and kings were anointed.
- The name "Christ" means "The Anointed One."
- Jesus "The Anointed One" serves as a prophet, priest, and king.
- In his role as a priest, Jesus represented the people before God.
- Jesus was a unique priest who offered himself up as a sacrifice for sin.
- The sacrifice of the sinless son of God was the only sacrifice that could pay for all sin.
- Not only did Jesus serve as a priest through his sacrifice, but he also intercedes and prays for us.
- Jesus is the only mediator we need between God and man.

Imagine being a citizen of a small country invaded by a powerful enemy. You know your country's army is no match for theirs. You are terrified.

Then, suddenly, you hear that the world's greatest superpower has deployed troops to ward off the invasion. In an instant, you go from hopelessness to joyous hope.

This is one way you can think of Christmas.

At Christmas, God didn't deploy a powerful army to save us. He deployed his powerful Son. And it wasn't to defeat a physical enemy. Talking about Jesus, Scripture says:

"Forasmuch then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, he also himself likewise took part of the same; that through death he might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil; And deliver them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage." HEBREWS 2:14-15

Even though Jesus was the powerful Son of God, he didn't look like it at Christmas. He was born in very humble circumstances. And this continued throughout his life. One time he said,

"The foxes have holes, and the birds of the air have nests; but the Son of man hath not where to lay his head."

MATTHEW 8:20

That wasn't the worst of it. About him, Scripture says,

"And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross."

PHILIPPIANS 2:8

Jesus humbled himself, even to the point of dying a shameful, painful death on the cross to save us. He couldn't save us just by being a good teacher and telling us what to do. Neither could he save us by being a perfect example showing us what we needed to do. Neither of these would work because, no matter how hard we try, we can't do what he says or follow his example. Sin had thoroughly corrupted us.

So he had to do it all for us. God deployed him as our substitute. As such, he did absolutely everything necessary to save us. He suffered and died for all our sins. And during his life, he kept all the commandments perfectly in our place. Incredibly, he credits his perfect obedience to us.

This is what makes Christmas so joyous. At Christmas, God deployed his Son to defeat the devil for us. And that is exactly what Jesus did!

- Helpless and hopeless, humanity needed saving from sin, death, and the devil's power.
- Humanity needed more than an example to show it the way; it required a substitute.
- God sent his Son as a substitute to defeat sin, death, and the devil for us.
- The way Jesus arrived at Christmas was unimpressive from a worldly point of view.
- The way Jesus lived as a humble servant was equally unimpressive from a worldly point of view.
- The way Jesus died on the cross again made him look weak from a worldly point of view.
- Jesus became our substitute by keeping the Law perfectly and suffering and dying in our place.
- Jesus credits us with his perfect obedience, and we are benefactors of his victories.

How are you doing at keeping God's commandments? Especially when you consider how Jesus explained them. Take murder. He taught that hurting somebody by calling them a name was nothing less than murder!

"Whosoever shall say, 'Thou fool, shall be in danger of hell fire."

He applied the same principle to adultery.

"Whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart." MATTHEW 5:28

Or how about his command not to worry. Worry is a sin because it is doing something Jesus told us not to do.

Unkind words, unclean thoughts, worry – these are just the tip of the iceberg. There are many other commandments, like loving our enemies and not being selfish. How are you really doing at keeping God's commandments?

No matter how hard we try, we can't come anywhere close to meeting God's standards.

As Scripture says,

"All have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." ROMANS 3:23

Nobody tried harder than the Apostle Paul. But he confessed: "For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do." No matter how hard we try, it's impossible to keep the commandments. Sin has robbed everybody of that capability.

Despite that, you don't have to despair! Jesus has come to your rescue! He died to pay for your sins. AND he did something else for you; namely, he lived for you. Not once did he break any of God's commandments. He did this, not for himself, but for you! He didn't live a perfect life to show you what YOU must DO. He knew you couldn't do it. Rather, he kept all the commandments FOR you. This is why one of his titles in Scripture is the "Lord, our Righteousness." He is the Lord, our Perfection. Jesus lived and died for you.

Seeing this can lift a tremendous burden off you. Through Jesus, right now, you are worthy before God. Seeing this can spur you on to doing good, not to be saved, but out of incredible joy for already being saved. Jesus has done everything for you.

The Lord Our Righteousness. Here the whole gospel, the whole message of Scripture, is summed up in a few precious words. The Lord himself is our righteousness. For that to be true, the Lord himself must have become one of us, having taken all that we are upon himself.

These words point us to the miracle of the incarnation, the Word made flesh. But they also point to that most comforting truth: not only is the Messiah righteous in himself, but through his perfect life of obedience, his suffering and death and rising to life, he won for us justification, reconciliation with God, the forgiveness of sins. What he is and what he has done, he has done for us. He has given to us a gift, the gift of righteousness, a righteousness that we could never have gained for ourselves. Here is the door that opens heaven and keeps it open: The Lord is our righteousness; yes, the Lord is my righteousness. What he did, he did for me. He has made me his own. This is my certainty, hope, and confidence: the Son of God who loved me and gave himself for me.

LESSON 10 A Humanitarian by Dying for Us

It's an incredible sight when lightning hits a building. At first, people are frightened because they think the building will be damaged or even destroyed. But then, when they see it emerge unscathed, their fright turns to amazement. How could the building not be damaged? The answer? It had a lightning rod which deflected the lightning down into the ground.

A lightning rod is one way to think of Christ's cross. At the cross, God unleashed his wrath over sin – all sin. He rained down his fearsome anger on Jesus because, as the prophet Isaiah said,

"The Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all." ISAIAH 53:6

Therefore, God figuratively hurled down lightning bolt after lightning bolt on Jesus. He punished Jesus for everybody's sin.

This is what the word "atone" means. Atone means to appease somebody who is angry. And God was extremely angry because of sin. It's easy to forget just how horrendous sin is. It is nothing less than a horrific affront to God's majesty. It is defiantly rebelling against him.

Therefore, God had to be appeased. This is what Jesus did for us on the cross. His cross

served as a lightning rod, deflecting God's wrath away. There Jesus made atonement for everybody's sins.

Because Jesus appeased God, all that remains for you is to experience the glow and warmth of Jesus' saving love.

That is if you are connected to the cross. Just like a lightning rod protects only the building, it's connected to, so also here. You are only protected from God's anger by the cross of Christ. It is essential to be connected to it. And only it. If you think God won't rain his wrath down on you because you are good enough, you are sorely mistaken. Nothing you do can protect you. The same holds true for anything else you look to for protection. Absolutely nothing will protect you except Jesus.

Be sure you are always connected to Christ's cross. Do that by trusting him completely for your salvation. Do that by abandoning trust in everything else: your goodness, your heritage, or any religious rites or rituals. Christ's cross stands alone as your only effective lightning rod. Trust in his atonement and be safe.

Extra Insights

God is a holy God who can't just wink at sins and dismiss the sinner's many infractions as if they didn't matter. God, in his Word, is clear and direct on that matter: "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). The sinner's life was forfeit. Sin had to be paid for with a life.

Again Scripture is clear: "Without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness" (Hebrews 9:22). Sin carried a heavy price that had to be paid—and it was! God sent his very own Son to be the substitute to die in our place. Christ became true man so that he might shed his blood as a sacrifice and die the sinner's death, or as Paul puts it, "God presented him as a sacrifice of atonement."

The apostle's terminology here reflects the activity God had directed Israel to observe annually on the great Day of Atonement. God commanded this festival as a graphic reminder of Israel's need to confess its sins and then symbolically transfer those sins to a scapegoat that was driven out into the wilderness, bearing away the sins of the people (Leviticus 16:1–34, particularly 20–22). God's intent was to remind Israel of its need for a Savior and to strengthen in them a longing for the promised Messiah, the Redeemer, who would do for them literally what was being enacted symbolically.

I walked in to find my wife staring at a piece of paper. As I looked closer, I saw she had been crying. I quickly went to her and asked what was wrong. She pointed to the paper and tearfully explained we had received it by special delivery. It was a notice stating our house was being foreclosed because we hadn't made our mortgage payments.

She said she wasn't concerned at first. She knew we made automatic payments from our checking account. She thought it would be easy to prove we had made the payments. But when she checked, she couldn't find any such record. She started to panic. That's when I walked in.

Not being able to prove you have paid a large bill can be unsettling, especially when the consequences of not paying it are dire. Vice versa, when you have solid proof you paid it, you aren't bothered. All you do is show your receipt or canceled check, and you are good to go.

Proof of payment is what God gave us when he raised Jesus from the dead. Right before he died, Jesus proclaimed,

"It is finished." JOHN 19:30

The word he used to say this was one commonly used to stamp bills "paid in full." What

Jesus finished with his death was the payment for all sin. Sin's debt, our debt, was paid in full.

Many people, however, don't believe this. They say we still must do something to pay for our sins – things like keeping the commandments. Others say even though Jesus paid the debt; we now must pay him back. Such thoughts can easily create a lot of doubt – and anxiety.

God doesn't want you to have any doubts about whether Jesus paid your debt. Neither does he want you to be like my wife, stressing over whether it had been paid. By raising Jesus from the dead, he gave us a receipt marked "paid in full." By raising Jesus from the dead, God put his stamp of approval on Jesus and his mission. He dramatically declared that Jesus did what he said he would do – that he gave his life as a ransom for all.

Don't misplace this receipt. Don't overlook its significance. Be confident that your sins are forgiven. That is what God wants you to be.

• The debt we owed God for our sin was impossibly large.

- Jesus' resurrection proves that the payment demanded by our sin was paid in full.
- We human beings have a hard time trusting that sin's payment is paid in full.
- Some think we can save ourselves by keeping the commandments.
- Others think that we have to pay Jesus back for what he has done for us.
- On the cross, Jesus cried out, "It is finished," and his resurrection proved it was.
- God doesn't want us to be filled with doubt or stress, so in Jesus, he says, "Paid in full."
- Jesus' resurrection was God's stamp of approval on Jesus payment for sin.
- Because Jesus lives, we can be confident that our sins are forgiven.

There's always a great deal of anticipation when the Supreme Court hands down a ruling in a controversial case. Everybody knows it will set the standard in that particular area for generations to come. Even its judgments, however, can be modified by future Supreme Court decisions.

This isn't the case when God, the ultimate Judge, gives a ruling. His judgment stands firm forever. It never changes.

His most significant ruling is declaring sinners not guilty! He can do this because Jesus completely appeased God's anger over mankind's sin. Scripture says,

"For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God; Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus." ROMANS 3:23-24

The word "justify" translates a word which was often used in a courtroom to describe an acquittal.

Pause and think how wonderful this is. The ultimate Judge, whose rulings never change, has legally declared you "not guilty." What is so amazing is that his verdict doesn't depend on anything you do. Remember how the Scripture said he rendered it "freely"

because it was based entirely on Jesus' redemption? Jesus was punished for all people's sins. As another Scripture says,

"He was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes, we are healed"

ISAIAH 53:5

It is essential to be crystal clear on this. Whenever you approach God, the only thing you will want to point to is what Jesus has done for you. Do that, and you have an airtight case. If, however, you also include something you have done – keeping the commandments or walking the covenant path – you instantly ruin your case. No matter what we point to, all we can add to Jesus' perfection is our imperfection - imperfection which God must condemn.

The verdict is in. God has already declared you "not guilty" because of Jesus. Believe it. And rejoice in it.

- God is the ultimate judge over all things, and everyone.
- God's rulings can never be overturned, and he will never change his mind.
- God has declared sinners not guilty because Jesus has appeased God's anger over sin.
- In Christ Jesus, we are justified, acquitted before God.
- God's verdict of "not guilty" does not depend on anything you have done or will do.
- Jesus was punished for all people's sins.
- The punishment that Christ received on our behalf brings us peace.
- Don't lose that peace by trying to add something to Jesus' work for you.
- The commandments and walking the covenant path cannot rescue you.
- Only Jesus can save you from sins' punishment, and he already has.

Lazarus had been dead for four days when Jesus arrived. Many mourners had gathered to comfort Lazarus' two sisters, Mary and Martha. They all accompanied Jesus as he visited Lazarus' tomb. At first, nothing seemed out of the ordinary as Jesus wept at the death of his friend. But suddenly it all changed! Jesus ordered them to roll away the stone from the tomb's entrance. Then he cried out, "Lazarus, come forth." And he came out!

Talk about a mind-blowing sight. Here is a man who had been dead four days coming out of his tomb. If this wasn't enough, we get the impression he didn't walk out normally because Scripture says he was bound hand and foot with grave clothes, and Jesus had to tell the people to unbind him. It had to be a jaw-dropping, unforgettable experience for all who witnessed it. We can well imagine them telling their friends and family about it for years to come.

What happened to Lazarus physically happens spiritually to everybody who believes in Jesus. Conversion is nothing less than a spiritual resurrection. Scripture says:

"But God, who is rich in mercy, for his great love wherewith he loved us, Even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ, (by grace ye are saved;)"

EPHESIANS 2:4-5

Quickened is a word we don't use much anymore. It means to make alive. God makes the spiritually dead alive. He does this by giving them faith in Jesus. In other words, he causes a conversion to happen within them. Instead of thinking they must do things to live with God for all eternity, they now believe and trust that Jesus has already done everything necessary for that to happen.

Just like Lazarus couldn't do anything to be raised from the dead, neither could they - or you. Conversion is entirely a work of God. Faith itself is a gift of God. This is how wonderful God is.

- **KEY POINTS**
- Dead things usually stay dead.
- Dead things cannot make themselves alive again.
- God can make dead things come back to life.
- Jesus raised the physically dead, like Lazarus, back to life through the power of his Word.
- Conversion is a spiritual resurrection that also takes place through the power of God's Word.

Faith Illustrated

The relationship between faith and salvation can be illustrated in the following way. Think of sin as a terrible disease that, if left untreated, always results in death. Think of God's gracious gift of Jesus Christ and his righteousness as the antidote to our sin. Think of faith as the way God gives you the antidote to sin—the benefits of Christ's death and resurrection.

When you received the injection of that antidote and your life was saved, you probably wouldn't sing the praises of that beautiful hypodermic needle. You'd sing the praises of the cure. The hypodermic needle had to be there, or you wouldn't have received the antidote. But you know that the needle isn't what saved you.

In a similar way, faith has to be there if someone is going to be saved (cf. John 3:16 or Acts 16:30,31). However, we know faith isn't the cause of salvation. Salvation is the result of the object of our faith, Jesus Christ. Through faith, we receive the benefits of his work.

Read John 11:1-57

In chapter 11 of his Gospel, John records at length the account of the raising of Lazarus. Take note of how John tells and draws out the story in detail. He does this to emphasize that Lazarus was dead, not just asleep but buried in the grave and unable to save himself.

Read chapter 13 of God—The Ultimate Humanitarian.

People love to hear good news. Think of how friends and family celebrate when a baby is born.

Or think of the celebrations that take place when people hear their team has won the championship. The streets quickly fill up as total strangers party with each other.

Taking it a step further, imagine how people celebrate when they hear a dreaded enemy has been defeated. The celebrations which broke out at the end of World War II were epic. As soon as they heard the news, people dropped what they were doing and celebrated.

The greatest news is that Jesus has already done everything needed for you to live eternally with God. This message surely deserves the title of gospel since the word "gospel" means good news. This truly is the best news of all.

Many people, however, change the "Done" of the gospel into a "Do." Instead of seeing that God sent Jesus in our place, to do it all for us, they say Jesus was a great teacher telling us what we must do to become acceptable to God. Still, others combine the two by teaching that Jesus did some things for us but not everything. He requires that we contribute to our salvation.

None of this is good news, however. Rather, it can be depressing, even crushing. It's like

telling a dirt poor man that you will pay most of his loan coming due, but not all of it. What good does that do if he can't meet the deadline? It makes matters even worse.

That's not the gospel, the good news of the Bible. The biblical gospel says Jesus paid the entire debt of your sin, and he doesn't want you to pay him back! It assures you that God forgives you freely and fully because of Jesus' payment.

Whatever you do, don't doubt the gospel.

Because of Jesus, God has forgiven you. Believe it! Rejoice in it!

LESSON 15 A Humanitarian by Giving Us Baptism

There's a big difference between a baby getting a bath and an adult taking a bath, isn't there? In the case of a baby, someone must do all the work. They must give the baby a bath. That isn't the case with adults, who bathe themselves.

The Word baptism simply means to wash. What is so instructive – and important! – is that Scripture consistently describes it like a baby getting a bath rather than an adult taking a bath. It never talks about people baptizing themselves. It always talks about getting baptized. For example, Peter urged people to "be baptized" (Acts 2:38). He didn't tell them to wash or baptize themselves.

Scripture is so consistent on this point because it wants us to be clear that baptism is not something we do for God. Rather it is something he does for us. Scripture says,

"Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." ROMANS 6:3-4

In a miraculous way, through baptism, God connects us to Christ and all its inherent benefits including the forgiveness of sins. When Peter told the people to be baptized, he

emphasized this by continuing, "Be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins."

Having the correct view of baptism is so important it emphasizes that God forgives us because of what Jesus did for us and not because of what we must do. This makes baptism most comforting. When you think of being baptized, don't think of an adult taking a bath. Rather picture yourself as a baby getting a bath – a bath which washes all your sins away.

- The Word baptism means "to wash."
- In baptism, God washes our sins away.
- In baptism, God connects us to Christ and all of the blessings that come through him.
- In baptism, we receive the remission of sins as we are connected to Christ's death.
- In baptism, we receive new life as we are connected to Christ's resurrection.
- Baptism is all about what Jesus did for us, not what we do for him.
- Baptism is more like a child getting a bath than an adult taking a bath.
 - The cleaning and the washing are done by someone else.
 - The child is merely a recipient of the cleaning and cleansing.
- Baptism is not something we do for God; it is something God does for us.

Through baptism, we have the comfort of knowing that when God looks at us, he doesn't see our sinfulness but Christ's perfection. That comfort is the beauty of baptism. Baptism is a way that God makes a "covenant of peace" with us. This covenant is based on faith in the work of Jesus Christ. The beauty of baptism is that even when we aren't faithful in keeping God's commands, God is faithful in offering us forgiveness. In Isaiah 54:10, God says his love for us "will not be shaken." His covenants will not "be removed." Incidentally, God's covenant of peace — his promise to forgive — is the reason that we don't need to be re-baptized every time we sin. Our unfaithfulness cannot negate God's faithfulness!

Read chapter 15 of God—The Ultimate Humanitarian.

The wife hangs her head. She feels sick inside. She had just failed her husband miserably. It wasn't the first time either. She is so disappointed with herself. She's kicking herself, wondering how he can forgive her – again.

Her husband is hurt. But he is also forgiving. He tells his wife that he forgives her. However, no matter how many times he says it, she still hangs her head. It's obvious she's having a hard time believing it. So, he gives her a big hug. "You are my wife. I love you. I forgive you," he whispers in her ear. Tears roll down her cheek as she tightly hugs him back. "I love you, too." Now she is convinced he has forgiven her.

In a way, this is what God does for us in the sacrament. Scripture never says that the sacrament is about our renewing our covenant with God. On the contrary, it says it is all about God reassuring us that, because of Jesus, he forgives us. When Jesus instituted it, he said,

"This cup is the new testament in my blood which is shed for you."

When Jesus describes it as the new testament, his disciples would immediately know what he was talking about. They were familiar with Jeremiah 31, which explains the new testament or covenant. There, the Lord himself describes the heart of the new

covenant-the forgiveness of sins. The Lord said,

"I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more." JEREMIAH 31:34

God can forgive us because the new covenant is based entirely on what Jesus did for us. This is what makes it new. The old covenant contained a lot of "ifs. If you follow the commandments, you will be blessed. But that didn't work because no one can consistently and continuously keep the commandments. So God sent his Son to keep them for us. Not only did Jesus do that, but he also paid for our sins with his death. Because of what Jesus did for us, God forgives us. And the sacrament is like God hugging us to reassure us of his forgiveness. It is truly his new testament, his new covenant. It truly is a source of great comfort.

- Humans have a hard time giving and accepting forgiveness.
- We have broken God's laws and deserve his wrath and punishment.
- Through Christ, we are forgiven of our sins.
- The sacrament is a one-sided new covenant that God makes with us.
- The old covenant contained a lot of conditional "ifs."
- We could not keep all the conditions of the old covenant commandments.
- The new covenant is based entirely on what Jesus did for us.
- In the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, God says, "I love you, and I forgive you."
- The sacrament is like a reassuring hug from God.

We have all been there. We call a company's 800 number and start working through a menu of choices. We become increasingly frustrated because none of the selections addresses our situation. All we want to do is talk with a live person! But no matter what we do, the menu stymies us. It won't connect us to a real person who can address our needs.

Prayer is nothing like this. There is no menu to work through. There are no busy signals or being put on hold. No angelic assistants are screening our prayers. Each time, we talk instantaneously, with God himself. It doesn't matter what the topic is, and it doesn't matter when we pray. God is there 24 – 7 to hear and answer all our problems. Scripture says,

"Casting all your cares upon him, for he careth for you" 1 PETER 5:7

We can have direct access to God because we can approach God in Jesus' name. Jesus said,

"And whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son." JOHN 14:13

Jesus isn't saying we must mechanically end each prayer with the phrase, "in Jesus' name." Instead, when we approach the Father in Jesus' name, we ask him to hear us for Jesus' sake and because of his worthiness. We are not claiming any worthiness of our own, but only pointing to what Jesus did for us. Covered entirely with Christ's perfection, God hears our prayers and responds to us as a parent, reacting to their child's cry for help.

Even when it comes to prayer, then, it's all about Jesus. By keeping all the commandments perfectly for us and by paying our entire debt of sin, Jesus has made us acceptable to God. Because of him, and only because of him, can we cast all our cares on God. Any care – at any time. This is the wonderful gift God gives us through Jesus.

- When we reach out to God in prayer, there are no busy signals or runarounds.
- Because of Jesus, we are worthy to approach God in prayer.
- God will respond to us like a parent listening to their dear child in need.
- On our own, we would be unworthy to approach God in prayer.
- Because of Jesus' worthiness, we have access directly to God.
- Those covered in Christ's perfection can pray to God at any time and in any need.
- Because of Jesus, and only because of Jesus, we can cast all our cares on God.
- Prayer is another wonderful gift from God.

The type of father a child has makes a huge difference, doesn't it? Some children don't even know who their fathers are. They miss out on his love. This fact can shape their entire lives. At the other end of the spectrum are the fortunate children who have excellent fathers who spend time with them, serve as their role models, and provide for them physically, morally, and spiritually. Their loving and active parenting gives them security in the present and prepares them for the future.

The same holds true for people who know God as their loving Father. But contrary to common opinion, not everyone is God's child. Scripture says:

"As many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name" JOHN 1:12

If every person were God's child by nature, God wouldn't have to give them the power or authority to become his children. Faith in Jesus, believing that Jesus did everything necessary for us to live eternally with Heavenly Father – this is what qualifies a person to be God's child.

And O does Heavenly Father long to shower his believing children with love! Scripture promises that God will ensure that everything in their lives will ultimately be for their

good. Even the apparent bad things. Heavenly Father will make sure good will come even from them. This is because it doesn't depend on our strength; it's based entirely on him. And we don't have to wait until after this life to start receiving good from God. We can already experience his goodness right now.

Scripture says "[His compassions] are new every morning" Lamentations 3:23. It's thrilling to see God continue to be such an active part of our lives. What a blessing it is to have such a loving Heavenly Father!

Imagine being invited to meet the person you admire more than anybody else. Maybe it's a famous author, or sports legend, or a well-known musician. Maybe it's the leading expert in your field or a highly respected politician.

How would you react if you received such an invitation? At first, you probably wouldn't believe it. Eventually, you realize it's true. From that moment on, you can hardly think of anything else. You fret about what you will wear and especially what you will say. You continually think about how it will play out.

Finally, the big day arrives. Your idol not only greets you but spends a half hour talking to you. You can't believe it. This half-hour becomes the highlight of your life.

This is nothing compared to what awaits those who will spend eternity in heaven. They will not only have a brief encounter with God; they will live with him for all eternity. Talking about heaven, Scripture says,

"God's dwelling place is now among the people, and he will dwell with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God"

REVELATION 21:3

What an awesome thought!

This applies to everybody who goes to heaven, for everybody there will have been perfected. Not by anything they had done. Not by their works. Their perfection is Jesus' gift to them. He kept the commandments perfectly and gives them the credit. He paid the price for all their sins. The perfection Jesus gives them is what makes them worthy to live eternally with God.

However, here a warning needs to be sounded. Only Christ can make anybody worthy. When a person mixes in their own worthiness, they contaminate Christ's perfect worthiness which makes them ineligible to live in heaven.

As you approach God, do so only based on what Jesus has already done for you. Do that, and you will have an awesome eternity living forever with God.

- Children of God will spend eternity with him in heaven.
- This will not be a brief or occasional encounter; believers will be with God forever.
- Those who are in heaven are perfect and therefore welcomed into God's presence.
- This perfection is given to God's children as a gift through the work of Jesus.
- Jesus' perfect obedience to God's commandments makes believers worthy before God.
- There is a great danger in trying to make oneself worthy outside of Jesus Christ.
- We can only approach God and be welcomed eternally into his presence because of Jesus.
- Don't try to approach God based on what you have done, but only because of Jesus.

Jesus' resurrection is one of the most critical events in all of history. It serves as dramatic proof that he paid for the sins of all people, just as he had proclaimed.

It was such a significant event that many people overlook the other important events which happened on Easter. One such thing was Jesus confirming the Bible as the one true scripture.

He confirmed the Bible's importance not once but twice on Easter. First, he unexpectedly joined two of his discouraged followers as they walked to the village of Emmaus. They didn't recognize him as he walked and talked with them. They shared how other followers had told them, "Jesus has risen," yet they remained unconvinced. Jesus then explained the significance of his death and resurrection. Significantly, he did this by citing the Bible.

"And beginning at Moses and all the prophets, he expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself" LUKE 24:27

"Moses and the prophets" was the common Jewish way of referring to the Old Testament. In other words, Jesus pointed them to the Bible.

We see Jesus again, pointing to the Bible, later that evening with his disciples. He said to them,

"These are the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled, which were written in the law of Moses, and in the prophets, and in the psalms, concerning me. Then opened he their understanding, that they might understand the scriptures" LUKE 24:44-45

It is immensely significant that right after he rose, Jesus pointed people to the Bible. By doing so, he showed that his resurrection didn't nullify its importance. Instead, it confirmed it. And never once in his entire ministry did Jesus even hint that there were additional or lost scriptures. Throughout his ministry, he pointed exclusively to the Bible.

The Bible is the one and only true scripture. The Bible is where you will come to know the only true God and Jesus Christ. The Bible tells you the only way to obtain eternal life, namely, by trusting that Jesus did everything to make you right with God. Believe this, and you will spend eternity living with God.

- On Easter, Jesus' resurrection is the most critical event that occurred.

- On Easter, Jesus twice pointed his followers to the promises of the Bible.
- The resurrection confirmed the importance of the Bible.

- Jesus never mentioned any lost or additional scriptures.
- The Bible tells us the only way to obtain eternal life.
- Eternal life is found only in the one to whom the Bible points and prophesies, namely Jesus.
